Message from the Deputy Commissioner



Shri Sandeep Singh, (IAS) Deputy Commissioner -cum-Chairman, District Mineral Foundation Trust, Ramgarh

Keeping the goals of DMF in alignment with the PMKKKY guidelines, various schemes are being implemented in the district of Ramgarh to develop mining affected areas in the sectors of health, education, livelihoods and to improve the standards of living.

To improve the health infrastructure, renovation of Sadar Hospital, setting up of blood bank, purchase of mortuary vehicles, recruitment of specialist doctors and medical officers for Sadar hospitals have been carried out. In the drinking water supply sector, 20 projects have been carried out to provide drinking water to rural households. To improve the nutritional status of women and children, materials have been supplied to 35 model Anganwadis. In education, construction of library, renovation of ST residential girls' school in Gola, renovation of Government middle school Sirka, Ramgarh middle school, construction of staff quarters, kitchen, dining hall in Mandu ST/SC school. To improve the infrastructure facilities, construction of bridges, development of a market complex, growth centres etc have been carried out. To provide livelihood opportunities projects like installation of fish cages, cultivation, farmers' training program (through audio-visual van) and distribution of a special breed of chicken, kadaknath, have been done.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Ramgarh, the board of trustees, the various line departments and other stakeholders without whose cooperation and unwavering commitment many of the initiatives would have never seen the light of day. I assure you that we have taken utmost care to ensure that the funds accrued under DMF are managed and utilised as per Jharkhand DMF Rules, notified by the state government.

On behalf of the board of trustees I welcome you to peruse the report and engage with us to enhance the quality of the mining affected people of Ramgarh.

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1. Executive Summary

In its third year of existence, the DMF continues to evolve as an institution that works for the inclusive growth of people in the mining areas. 66 projects were carried out under different sectors such as drinking water, health, education, etc. with the aim of transforming the district. In the year 2018-19 total funds received by the district was approx 158 Cr. with opening balance for the financial year starting in 2018 at approx 249 Cr. Approximately 337 cr was spent on the various development activities in the district. At the end of the financial year 2019 the account balance was 71 Cr. 88.2 % of the total sanctioned amount was for drinking water supply, 8.4 % for the upgradation of infrastructure and the remaining for other sectors.

DMF is focussing on the various facets of human developments and has focussed on the basic infrastructure. In the context of education, various activities were carried out to improve the educational infrastructure. To improve healthcare facilities in the district, recruitment of specialist doctors, renovation of district hospital and setting up of blood bank was done. To develop the infrastructural capacity of the district various bridges, market complex, crematorium and panchayat growth centre were constructed. To increase livelihood opportunities, poultry cultivation, farmers' training and installation of RFF and cage aquaculture were carried out. AWCs are being developed into model anganwadis.

Following are the list of successful projects in the districts:

- 1. Recruitment of Specialist doctors was done to cope with the lack of doctors in the district.
- 2. District invested in new and controlled ways of fish production to cater to the needs of the market and to generate employment.
- 3. With the aim of providing tap water to each and every household, laying of pipelines and filtration projects were carried out in the district
- 4. Upgradation of Educational Infrastructure for SC/ST students in Mandu.
- 5. Capacity building of Farmers through audio-visual training


Going forward various activities are planned, below are the areas of focus:

In education, smart classes and science labs have been planned. To improve access to sanitation, construction of toilets have been planned. In the infrastructure sector, with the aim of having improved connectivity, construction of various bridges have been planned. For the welfare of women & children, renovation and construction of various anganwadis have been planned.

These projects/programs will complement the existing/ongoing schemes/projects of State and Central Government to meet the following objectives: (a) to minimize/mitigate the adverse impacts, during and after mining, on the environment, health and socio-economics of people in mining districts; and (b) to ensure long term sustainable livelihoods for the affected people in mining areas.


Mineral Overview of Ramgarh

District Mineral Foundation Trust

What is DMFT

District Mineral Foundations (DMF) are statutory bodies established by the State Governments by notification. They derive their legal status from section 9B of Mines and Minerals (Development and Regulation) Act, 1957 as amended on 26th March, 2015 as Mines and Minerals (Development and Regulation) Amendment Act, 2015. This amendment came into force from 12th January, 2015. Each DMF is a trust established in the mining affected districts across the country.

The objective of DMF is to work for the interest of the persons and areas affected by mining related operations in such manner as may be prescribed by the State Government, from time to time.

Mission

The mission of the District Mineral Foundation (DMF) Trust is to "work for the welfare and development of mining affected communities".

Vision

The vision of the District Mineral Foundation (DMF) Trust is to "alleviate the adverse impacts of mining on communities and environment, and create sustainable development opportunities for current and future generations".

Functions of the TRUST

The DMF Trust is responsible for:

- a) The implementation of various welfare and developmental projects in mining affected areas
- b) Minimizing/mitigating the adverse impacts, during and after mining, on the environment, health and socio-economic status of the people in mining areas
- c) Ensuring long term sustainable livelihoods for the affected people in mining areas

It undertakes the following activities for this purpose:

- a) Receives, maintains, manages, releases and utilizes the funds accrued
- b) Plans, identifies, designs and undertakes suitable welfare and developmental projects, following due procedure
- c) Monitors and coordinates with various executing agencies at field level for successful implementation of projects taken up
- d) Ensures convergence with ongoing/existing schemes/projects of State and Central Government
- e) Identifies and promotes innovative solutions
- f) Ensures regular and swift redressal of grievances
- g) Coordinates with Planning and Convergence Department (GoO) and Steel and Mines Department (GoO)
- h) Any other work entrusted

About Pradhan Mantri Khanij Kshetra Kalyan Yojna (PMKKKY)

Pradhan Mantri Khanij Kshetra Kalyan Yojana (PMKKKY) is a programme launched on 17 September 2015 to provide for the welfare of areas and people affected by mining related operations. PMKKKY is implemented by the District Mineral Foundations (DMFs) of the respective districts using the funds accruing to the DMF from mines. (Khanij means Mineral and Kshetra means area or field in Hindi. Kalyan stands for welfare and Yojana stands for a Plan or project). The Pradhan Mantri Khanij Kshetra Kalyan Yojana (PMKKKY) will be implemented by the District Mineral Foundations (DMFs) of the respective districts using the funds accruing to the DMF.

Objectives of PMKKKY

The overall objective of PMKKKY scheme will be:

- (a) to implement various developmental and welfare projects/programs in mining affected areas, and these projects/programs will be complementing the existing ongoing schemes/projects of State and Central Government
- (b) to minimize/mitigate the adverse impacts, during and after mining, on the environment, health and socio-economics of people in mining districts
- (c) to ensure long-term sustainable livelihoods for the affected people in mining areas.

Governance & Management of DMFT

MMDR Amendment 2015 requires State Governments to establish District Mineral Foundation (DMF) as per section 9B, that will be used for development of mining affected people and the areas. All DMFs shall also implement Pradhan Mantri Khanij Kshetra Kalyan Yojana (PMKKKY) notified on 16 September 2015. Accordingly, Government of Jharkhand issued a notification for constitution of DMF Trust in each district of Jharkhand on 24 November 2015 along with the details of the Governing Council and Managing Committees (Gazette No. 854 dated 07 December 2015). Further, Jharkhand District Mineral Foundation (Trust) Rules, 2016 was notified on 22 March 2016 (Gazette No. 218 dated 23 Mar 2016) and they were extended for minor minerals, too, on 13 January 2017. (Gazette No 109 dated 27 Jan 2017).

Date of Formation: 15th March 2016

Managing Committee

The Management of the Trust vests in a Governing Council, which consists of all the members of the Trust. However, the day to day management of the Trust is be managed by a Managing Committee.

The Managing Committee is responsible for –

- Coordinating, consolidating and developing the annual plan of the Trust as per the provisions laid in the guidelines of Pradhan Mantri Khanij Kshetra Kalyan Yojna (PMKKKY).
- Approving the lists of work under Priority and other priority areas beneficiaries as identified by the committee;
- Distributing monetary benefits through bank transfer to the beneficiaries under extreme cases on approval of the Governing Council. Explanation: Families displaced by very old mines and resettled in a different village, as identified under Rule 12(3)(c)(ii), is not to be considered as beneficiary. For the purpose of this sub-rule, for distributing monetary benefits priorities is given to those living below poverty line, orphans, widows, single mothers, physically challenged persons, senior citizens, etc.
- Undertaking such other activities as are in furtherance of the objective of the Trust, and as per the provisions laid in the guidelines of PMKKKY.
- Appointing officers to run the Trust and auditors; however, these appointments requires ratification by the Governing Council;
- Organising meetings of the Trust;
- Presenting audit reports for ratification to the Governing Council.

Governing Council


The functions of the Governing Council are as follows:

- Laying down the broad policy framework for the functioning of Trust and reviewing its working from time to time.
- Drawing up and approving of Annual Action Plan and the Annual Budget for Trust. The Annual Action plan is prepared and approved by the Governing Council at least one month before commencement of the year. The Annual Action Plan contains the list of schemes and projects with the tentative provisions thereof. Provided that if for any reason whatsoever, the Governing Council does not prepare and accord approval to the Annual Plan and the Budget within the specified time, the Chairman shall have Annual Action Plan and the Budget of the Trust prepared to approve the same. The Budget so prepared shall be deemed to have been duly prepared and approved by the Governing Council.Provided also that while preparing the annual plan for the next financial year, the sum total of the past commitment and liabilities spilling over shall be assessed. To maintain financial discipline and timely completion of project, the sum total of the past liabilities and commitments and the new schemes being proposed should not in any case exceed three times the expected inflows for the next financial year.
- Approving such other expenditure, in furtherance of the objects of the Trust from the available Trust Fund in such manner as may be prescribed by the settlor.
- Approving the recommendations of the Managing Committee;
- Approving the annual reports and audited accounts of the Trust within 60 days of the close of the previous year;

Contribution to DMF Fund

Rate of Contributions to the DMFT is as follows:

- 30% of the royalty amount payable for major mineral mines allocated before 12.01.2015 and for the existing minor mineral leases which are not granted through auction.
- 10% of the royalty amount payable from leaseholder for major mineral mines allocated after 12.01.2015 and for minor mineral leases which are granted through auction.



5 Planning & Allocation

Annual Planning Process

DMFT practices a bottom-up planning approach to understand people's needs and include such considerations in the DMF plan. As per provisions of Jharkhand DMFT Rules 2016, selection of schemes is to be done entirely by the Gram Sabhas and as per provisions of PMKKKY guidelines. The Gram Sabha in consultation with the Mukhiya / Up-mukhiya has to identify works to be carried out under priority and other priority areas. The Managing Committee does not have any overriding power on selection or approval of the schemes.

Administrative Process of Approving Projects




6 Projects under PMKKKY Scheme

An Overview

Total 66 schemes have been taken under the DMF in the FY 2018-19, where 88.2 % of the total schemes were in drinking water vertical, 8.4 % in the Infrastructure Vertical, 1.59 % in the Skill Development Sector, 0.5 % in Health and the remaining. Education and Welfare of Women and Child were taken in the FY 2018-19.

As on 31st March, 2019, total amount sanctioned was **5,12,95,43,589.00** and spent under various schemes of DMFT. Out of the total funds, 88.2% is allocated towards drinking water supply in Ramgarh, 8.4% is allocated towards infrastructure development, 0.5 % in Health and the remaining in other Sectors.


Analysis of Fund Allocation



The Ministry of Mines, through the Mines and Minerals (Development and Regulation) Act, 1957 (2015 Amendment) authorizes all District Mineral Foundations (Trust) to collect part of the royalties coming from the mining companies (10 % royalty collected from companies involved in mining activities on or after 12th January, 2015 and 30 % royalty collected from companies involved in mining activities before 12th January, 2015). Fund collection directly depends upon mining production.

Sector-wise Fund Allocation

The Ramgarh District Administration as per the PMKKKY guidelines, allocated an amount of **5,12,95,43,589.00** from the DMFT to uplift the mining affected populace for the year 2018-19. Out of the total funds, 88.2 % is allocated towards drinking water supply in Ramgarh, 8.4 % is allocated towards infrastructure development, 0.5 % in Health and the remaining in other sectors.

The table on the right shows the released and sanctioned amount by DMFT for the various sectors


Out of the total sanctioned amount 91% was allocated towards the high priority sectors such as those of drinking water supply, education, health, skill development and welfare of women and children. Further, 8.4 % was allocated towards other priority areas such as that of infrastructure.

46 schemes were sanctioned in the high priority areas while 20 were those in the other priority areas.

The total sanctioned amount in all the sectors was **5,12,95,43,589.00** with approximately 88.2% amount allocated towards Drinking Water Supply.

Success Stories

Upgradation of Health Facility





Summary:

Seven Specialist doctors have been recruited through convergence of NHM and DMF (T) so that healthcare facilities could be provided to residents within the district. Ramgarh now stands as the only district in Jharkhand to conform to IPHS norms

Introduction:

Due to the lack of doctors/facilities in the district hospital, Ramgarh, many people were unable to get treatment at the right time and in the case of emergencies, people had to depend on RIMS and other private hospitals, which is located 50 kilometers away from Ramgarh district. In some instances, before reaching Ranchi, the patient died due to lack of treatment. In view of this, the Ramgarh DC and other officials decided to recruit specialist doctors at the Ramgarh district hospital through DMFT and NHM. Through this recruitment, the district administration recruited 07 specialist doctors and 3 medical officers (2 Orthopaedics, 1 Surgeon, 1 Pathologist, 1 Psychiatrist and 3 Medical officers through DMF(T) funds and 1 Pediatrician and 1 ENT recruited through NHM). As a result, the residents of Ramgarh district can get treatment at the right time.

After this successful recruitment drive, Ramgarh has attained the status of being the first district in Jharkhand to fulfil the IPHS norms regarding availability of specialist services. In addition, the district administration is also working to upgrade the infrastructure in the hospital such as construction of a blood bank, purchase of OT/General equipment, renovation work of hospital buildings etc. so that more and more residents are benefitted.

The objectives of the initiative:

• The main objective of this initiative is to upgrade healthcare facilities in the district through the recruitment of requisite specialist doctors in accordance with NHM guidelines, improving infrastructural facilities and the purchase of OT/general equipment in the district hospital.

- To fulfil the norms set by Indian Public Health Standards (IPHS) regarding availability of specialist doctor services in the district hospital.
- To provide treatment facilities related to Orthopedics, Surgery, Psychiatry, Pediatrics, Pathology & ENT in the district hospital through this project so that the residents of Ramgarh district do not have to depend on private hospitals

Work done under the initiative:

- Through the convergence of NHM and DMF (T), the district administration offered many facilities such as attractive salary, accommodation arrangements near the hospital etc. so that the doctors recruited should be motivated to work in the district hospital.
- We are in the process of upgrading other facilities in the hospital. A blood bank has been constructed and we are in the process of procuring general equipment for the Orthopedic OT through DMF (T) funds.
- The monthly monitoring data reports show that the number of patients are increasing in this hospital now. The concerned patients, who previously approached private hospitals for treatment, are now taking advantage of these new facilities in the district hospital.

Outcomes- Impact/ benefits resulting from the initiative:

Outcome: So far 71,285 patients have been treated by the newly recruited specialist doctors, in which there are 1059 minor surgeries, 54 major surgeries and only 372 patients referred from here. (Data from 19th December 2018 to 31st January 2020). A total of 11830 patients have been treated by the Medical Officers since January 2019. The district administration started to monitor the work progress of the doctors through a monthly data report in a specific format as designed by the district administration. With the help of new doctors, the number of patients approaching the district hospital for treatment has increased manifold. As a result, the dependency of the people in Ramgarh on RIMS hospital, Ranchi has decreased now. After the recruitment of new doctors, the number of referral cases has also decreased considerably.

Aquaculture: Cage Aquaculture and Riverine Fish Farming

Summary:

The district administration has, with the objective of uplifting the lives of downtrodden and economically backward people, invested in controlled fish production on a large scale through the DMF (District Mineral Foundation) funds. These projects have been operational in the Nalkari and Bhairva reservoirs in Patratu and Dulmi respectively since May 2019. 539 people have been provided a source of livelihood.

Introduction:

Nalkari and Bhairva reservoirs are the main storage reservoirs of Nalkari and Bhairva dam respectively. Both the reservoirs have huge potential for livelihood generation for the local population. The areas around Nalkari and Bhairva reservoirs are inhabited by those displaced by the construction of dams and mines. Income generation was low and unemployment rates high. Given the lack of opportunities in these areas, people were migrating to other areas and looking for other sources of income. Generating livelihood for the affected people is an important means to mitigate the adverse impact of development. Taking cognisance of the issue, district administration felt that greater investment in aquaculture would help generate more employment and income. Further, it aimed to ensure that the gap between demand and supply for fish reduces given how demand outstrips supply in Jharkhand.

With the introduction of RFF and cage culture on a large scale, it has changed the manner in which fish is being produced. There are 8 cooperatives in Nalkari and Bhairva reservoirs which have a total of 539 members. Thus, 539 people have been provided with a source of livelihood. These projects have successfully addressed the day to day issues of local displaced fishermen like poverty, unemployment, rural-urban migration, malnutrition etc. Based on this other districts like Saraikela and Hazaribagh have sought to replicate this project.

Objectives of the initiative:

- 1. To promote the fisheries industry in Ramgarh so as to help boost local economy through the generation of employment
- 2. To provide a source of livelihood to the economically backward/displaced people in the target areas.
- 3. To stem the migration of people to other areas in search of economic opportunities.

Work done under the initiative:

- 1. The district administration has invested in controlled fish production on a large scale by promoting Riverine Fish Farming and cage aquaculture.
- 2. On-site cage houses, equipped with solar plates and light, were set up for the effective monitoring of the project. 3 groups were formed for monitoring, namely in charge of accounts, feeding, cleaning, which were deployed on a rotation basis.
- 3. For effective monitoring of the area and to prevent unauthorized fishing, 8 speed motor boats were provided at both the reservoirs, and other important facilities like Wi-Fi, CCTV cameras, life jackets were also provided.
- 4. Through capacity building and training the 8 producer groups involved in the projects have been strengthened.

Outcomes:

The project is a one-of-a-kind initiative within the state that seeks to promote aquaculture on such a large scale. RFF and cage aquaculture have been successfully implemented in the district. These projects have successfully addressed the day to day issues of local displaced fishermen like poverty, unemployment, rural-urban migration, malnutrition.

There are a total of 539 people, organized into 8 producer groups, who are now engaged in aquaculture in Bhairva and Nalkari. The cooperatives have been empowered through their involvement in the decision-making process. These projects have provided a source of livelihood to those displaced in Pataratu and Dulmi blocks. A steady source of employment has meant that fewer people migrate to more developed areas for employment. A bottom-up approach was been incorporated which promotes cooperative societies and helps empower people rather than just providing employment without trusteeship. As members of cooperatives the people have a say in the decision-making process and participate in their own empowerment. This generates a sense of ownership among people, thus strengthening institutions at the grassroots.

Fish farms are meeting the demand from markets in Ranchi and Sarsara, Bihar, thus ensuring a good stream of revenue. Local demand for fish is also being met on a smaller scale as of now. The revenue generated is channelled into the cooperative bank account thus ensuring that cooperatives manage their funds collectively. Fish production is expected to stand at 755 MT from both reservoirs. 7 tonnes worth of fish has been sold already to local buyers. Fishermen who are not direct beneficiaries have also benefited by providing invaluable services in the form of harvesting of fish. It is anticipated that after some time ancillary industries, such as transport, packaging, processing etc., will be set up to complement the fish farm industry. The success of the project can be demonstrated by the fact that 3 more cooperatives are willing to get involved. We hope to expand the reach of the project to other deserving beneficiaries.

Improving Access to Safe Drinking Water



Summary:

Ramgarh being a mining area, availability of clean drinking water is a major challenge in the district. Given the high levels of pollution, only treated tap water/treated piped can be assumed to be relatively safe. The project aims at providing safe drinking water to each and every household.

Earlier people used to mainly depend either from the water from hand pumps or unsafe water from river or ponds which they had to carry from distant places. Due to the initiatives that being taken now, people are able to get water at their doorsteps which helps them save time and reduces the excessive labor that was done to carry the water from far off places. Filtration plants have been installed before the water is distributed so as to get rid of any harmful impurities and make water safe for consumption.

Problem:

Due to the unavailability of clean drinking water and poor sanitation, incidences of water and vector-borne diseases such as diarrhea and malaria are high, particularly amongst children. Data from the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (2017), indicates that children below the age of five years are particularly vulnerable to these. The problem is pervasive across urban and rural areas.

Anganwadis: Categorically 30 to 40 percent of AWCs (except for in Ramgarh) do not have drinking water facilities within premises. Out of the overall 1037 anganwadis in the district, 37.3 % of the overall anganwadis lack drinking water facilities as per the studies conducted by CSE.

Schools: In Schools access to tap water is very limited. As per the report by the DISE 2015-16, only 6.7 % of the schools have access to tap water facilities with Gola and Dulmi being the most affected having merely 1.4 and 1.3 % of the schools with tap water facilities respectively.

Rural Areas: The proportion of tap water facilities is merely above one percent in rural areas, which is a key concern for children's health. Categorically more than 90 percent of schools in the district do not have tap water facilities.

Most of the households rely heavily on untreated groundwater sourced through hand pumps or uncovered wells. In Patratu and Chitarpur, the proportion of households using treated tap water is only slightly better, about 38 percent and 26 percent respectively. The proportion is alarmingly low in the rural mining-affected block Gola where the access is a mere two percent. While Patratu being a predominantly urban area is slightly better off but even there about 62 percent of households do not have access to treated tap water Scientific studies on water pollution in Ramgarh district (including sampling areas around the coal mines) have shown the presence of heavy metals such as iron and lead exceed the prescribed limits. Apart from the presence of these two metals, the Rajrappa area has also recorded the presence of cobalt beyond permissible limits.

Work done under the Initiative:

Taking into account the situation on the ground, the following initiatives were taken up by the District Administration:

Laying Distribution pipeline and filtration plants - This project aimed at providing access to tap water each and every household. Water from the river is drawn which is then filtered and treated with bleaching, chlorine, alum, and lime. After which it is distributed to elevated tanks through the pipelines laid, the water is then pumped to each and every household serving approximately 200 households per scheme.

Outcome:

- 09 schemes were taken up by the DWSD Departement by laying pipelines and filtration plants benefitting in the FY 2018-19 impacting and providing tap water facility to 12,642 households. The scheme is ongoing with the aim of providing tap water facility to each and every household by 2024
- Self-sustenance of the project by involving Mukhiyas and getting a committee within the village for maintenance and monitoring.
- The improved reach of clean and safe water to AWC, Schools and Rural Population.
- Reducing the efforts and time required to fetch safe drinking water. Earlier people used to collect
 water from the river which required massive efforts and a lot of time was also invested in fetching
 the for the same
- Initiatives were made keeping in mind the reducing water table, the project keeps in mind this fact and tries to address the reducing water issues too through soak pits that were constructed to address the issue.
- Reducing toxic mineral content in the water and making it suitable for consumption purposes.
- Reducing the cost of safe drinking water. Earlier people invested almost INR 300/month which was then reduced to INR 62/month reducing the burden on the people to spend an excess amount that was invested to avail drinking water

Providing world class educational facilities

Problem:

Ramgarh being a mining area, availability of good educational infrastructure for the SC/ST students have been a huge challenge. The infrastructure available earlier was inadequate and lacked facilities of labs, library, etc.

Solution:

With the aim of providing world class infrastructure and amenities to the students belonging to the SC/ST students an initiative was taken through which more than 250+ students will be impacted and providing them with a platform for their dreams. The reconstruction of the building took place in Mandu through which the 24 modern classrooms were created with the availability of 10+ 2 toilets for the students. The project started on 30th July 2018 and is aimed to be completed on 29th January 2020. Separate facilities for residential facilities for teachers, students is also under construction. The overall approximate cost of the project is 3.88 Cr. Kitchen, staff rooms, library, Science rooms, lobby were also constructed.

Including the development of School at Mandu, the following activities have been done to improve educational Infrastructure in Ramgarh:

- Development of Model School, Ramgarh Toilet Construction and Building Renovation.
- Upgradation of SC/ST School in Gola Hostel, School Building, Water & Sanitation Facility.
- Construction of Community Library.

Outcome/ Benefits from the Project:

With the completion of the project the school will be able to facilitate more than 250 students per year providing them with the infrastructural capacity to realise their dreams.

Audio-visual van: building capacities of agricultural workers





Summary:

In an effort to build the capacities of farmers a training program was initiated wherein an audio-visual van was deployed on the 22nd of December 2018 to provide training and to spread awareness about the latest farming practices/techniques.

Introduction:

A significant proportion of the district's population, particularly in rural areas is dependent on agriculture for livelihoods. For instance, in the mining affected block Gola about 76% of main workers are agriculture dependent. To build capacities of the farmers, the district implemented its project of training through an audio-visual van. The van covered all 6 blocks of the district and conducted 250 days of training. The training covers various aspects of farming such as those of integrated pest management, packaging of vegetables, mushroom cultivation, drip irrigation, animal husbandry etc.

The audio-visual van covered a total of 125 villages. The project has provided training to 24794 farmers in the district. The aim was to ensure that the visual and the audio aspects of the project encourage easy learning and understanding. The trainers also held discussions with the farmers to ensure that their queries were dealt with to increase awareness about farming practices/techniques.

Details:

- An audio-visual van was deployed which covered 66 panchayats and 125 villages.
- 250 days of training was provided to farmers.
- Various topics were covered such as integrated pest management, packaging of vegetables, mushroom cultivation, drip irrigation etc.
- Audio-visual van covered distances that farmers might not have been able to cover in order to access the training.

9 Way Forward

The Ramgarh District Administration as per the PMKKKY guidelines, allocated an amount of 5,17,12,84,839 from the DMFT to uplift the mining affected populace for the year 2018-19. Out of the total funds, 87% has been allocated towards drinking water supply in Ramgarh,8 % is allocated towards infrastructure development and the remaining in other sectors.

Looking forward various activities and projects have been planned to improve the conditions in the mining areas. Departments and blocks in coordination with Gram Sabha have also decided number of schemes to be taken up in different sectors of health, education, sanitation, environment conservation and beautification etc. in the areas impacted by mining operations of Ramgarh.

To improve the Health conditions 52 health centres have been identified in Ramgarh including PHCs, CHCs and HSCs have been identified which will be provided with drinking water supply and toilets. In addition to it, upgradation of existing infrastructure and providing with new and essential equipments and medicines has been planned. To meet the manpower requirements of the health centres as per the IPHS guidelines, specialist doctors, medical officers and other essential manpower (lab technicians etc) will be recruited. With the aim of making Ramgarh self sufficient with respect to blood availability in the district provision of ACs, generator sets, electrification works etc. to get the blood bank running.

To improve the conditions of women and children upgradation of selected 35 AWCs as model AWCs by providing them with necessary material, infrastructure renovation and painting work. In Education, development of 20 selected schools as model schools by improving the infrastructure, library, science lab, ICT lab and ATLs. Also, development of KGBV Gola as model school by providing the necessary, library, science lab, ICT lab and ATLs. To improve the infrastructure facilities, development of community development centre, panchayat growth centre, multipurpose hall, markets have been planned

In coming years, DMFT will make the planning process more participative and bottom-up through usage of Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) tools and need analysis. This will help in attainment of the objective of DMFT and PMKKKY in letter as well as spirit in these mining affected regions.
